Dear Parent/Carer,

It's been another busy week at Montsaye Academy with lots of great things going out on social media and lots of successes to celebrate.

Miss Neville, our Assistant Principal who leads on literacy and oracy, led a very powerful and hugely emotive virtual assembly for all year groups on the power of words. Her assembly centred on the book Away with Words by Sophie Cameron in which a girl called Gala — who speaks very little English — moves from Spain to Scotland and befriends a selective mute called Natalie. In Gala's world, the words we speak are visible and appear different colours such as red for angry words and sparkling yellow if the words are happy. The assembly explored the power of words and encouraged students to reflect on how the most recent words they have spoken would appear and what the impact of the words was. The assembly finished on a rather apt quotation from the legendary, albeit fictional, Headmaster Albus Dumbledore who said "Words are, in my not-so-humble opinion, our most inexhaustible source of magic. Capable of both inflicting injury and remedying it."

Year 11s completed their first week of mock examinations and I am so proud of the way they have conducted themselves.
